


#### **Trends in Child Care**

In most parts of Washington, the number of child care providers has dropped over the past few years while the total capacity for children has been relatively stable since June 2014.

In Washington State, the number of child care providers has dropped from 7,486 with capacity for 173,977 children in 2008, to 5,793 providers with capacity for 166,834 children in June of 2015.\*

# **Early Achievers**

Early Achievers is Washington's Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS), which gives training, technical assistance, coaching, awards, scholarships, and other benefits to child care providers to improve the quality of their care.

# Statewide, 2,758 child care providers have joined since July 2012.

Approximately 46% of licensed child care providers in WA are enrolled in Early Achievers, serving over 58,000 children\*. Early Achievers will provide families with valuable child care program quality rating information so they can make informed child care choices.



In FY2015, Child Care Aware of Washington programs helped 16,027 families find child care providers matching their unique needs.

In Washington State, we helped 16,027 families with 23,114 children in need of child care to search for matching providers 23,203 times.
