



## **Child Care Aware of Washington**

2020 Child Care Crisis Impact

## Washington is experiencing a child care crisis with far-reaching impacts for children, families, businesses and communities.

- Child care breakdowns cost Washington employers \$2.08 billion per year<sup>1</sup>
- Child care issues cost Washington's economy \$6.5 billion in opportunity costs<sup>1</sup>
- 61% of Washington's children under age 6 live in homes where all adults work<sup>2</sup>
- Over 54% of all entering kindergartners are not ready for school when they enter<sup>3</sup>
- 49% of working parents find it difficult or very difficult to find and keep child care<sup>1</sup>
- 67% of WA's employers report that child care issues caused employee absenteeism<sup>5</sup>

- 27% of working parents left their job or school due to child care issues1
- WA's child care educators earn so little they often qualify for public assistance and earn less than pet groomers
- 63% of Washingtonians live in a "child care desert" where there is no child care or only one available child care space for every three children who need care4
- State child care subsidy rates are so low they do not cover the costs of quality child care
- Between 26%- 30% of child care programs report having an opening for a lead teacher<sup>6</sup>
