Child Care Aware of Washington Family Center News for Families

After a challenging 16 months enduring the pandemic and the economic hardships it caused, families across the country can look forward to better times ahead. New cases of COVID-19 are down, as are hospitalizations and deaths. More people are vaccinated, including children as young as 12, and there is hope that a COVID-19 vaccine for younger children will be available soon. Businesses are hiring and Gov. Inslee fully reopened Washington State June 30th.

Additionally, a new law that strengthens our state's child care system became law in May. The Fair Start for Kids Act benefits families with young children and child care providers, and some of the key benefits start this month. One of the biggest benefits is that child care subsidy copayments for families have been waived for July—September. That means families relying on Working Connections Child Care subsidies do not have to pay for child care during the summer. When family copayments restart in October 2021, they will be capped at \$115. Some families will pay less. Another key benefit of the Fair Start for Kids Act increases state payments to child care providers who care for children whose families use Working Connections Child Care subsidies. This means providers will earn a little more income, which can allow them to increase compensation for their staffs and possibly serve more children. 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Family Child Care Copayments Waived for Summer

Working Connections Child Care subsidy family copayments have been waived for the months of July, August and September. When copayments restart in October, they will be capped at \$115. Visit help/wccc for more information.

Help for Families Experiencing Homelessness

This is an especially hard time to experience homelessness. Children who experience homelessness frequently live in unpredictable, chaotic circumstances, with disruptions in their environments and relationships. These experiences can impair their emotional, cognitive and behavioral development.

It's critically important that young children experiencing homelessness receive the opportunity to play, learn and create friendships with their peers. Attending child care can provide all of this and more. Research shows quality child care can even act as a buffer for young children against the harmful effects of toxic stress.

Child Care Aware of Washington's Family Center helps families with young children who are experiencing homelessness find child care at no cost to them for up to one year, and helps them with their applications for Working Connections Child Care. Child Tax Credit

Did you know it is not too late to file 2020 federal income taxes and qualify for the Child Tax Credit? The American Rescue Plan Act expands this tax credit to most families, even those that do not normally file taxes. Most families may receive \$250—300 per child, per month with the Child Tax Credit, and some may also receive the \$1400 per person stimulus check if they did not already receive it. When Will COVID-19 Vaccines for Young Children be Available?

Many parents want to know when a vaccine for children ages 0-11 will be available.



Some experts have said it is possible that at least one vaccine for children ages 5—11 could possibly be available by fall, but more are estimating it will be next year before one is ready. A vaccine for younger children could be ready fairly soon after that.

Safety testing on two of the main vaccines currently available to people ages 12 and up, Pfizer and Moderna, is happening at several children's hospitals around the U.S. Until results of these testing programs are known and vaccines are approved for children, parents should rely on their child's pediatrician for details on when their child may be ready to be vaccinated.

"Being around kids is the most joyful experience," says Miranda Kirk, family child care provider in Lakewood.

Early Achievers—Improving Washington's Child Care System

Washington's Early Achievers program helps child care providers across our state improve the quality of their programs. It also gives families a rating system to help them better understand a particular child care program's quality. Early Achievers programs are rated by the University of Washington and earn ratings from Level 2 to 5. A Level 3 or higher is considered to be a "Quality Level of Excellence."

Early Achievers is free for providers to join. It opens up great supports and resources like early learning coaching. There are more than 3,800-providers participating in Early Achievers and over 75,000 young children enrolled in Early Achievers programs.
